Streamline eligibility, processes, and information

- Income Guidelines Research using Washington State Median Income vs Federal Poverty Guidelines. Standardize low-income eligibility requirements where appropriate.
- Customer Donations Review the possibility of expanding customer donations to be used for all utility services; currently only for power utility bills.
- Assessable information Combine utility assistance, energy efficiency, water efficiency and home repair programs into a single marketing tool with multilingual versions



Tacoma Power low-income energy efficiency programs






Tacoma Power Customer Energy Programs

- A team of 30 Tacoma Power employees dedicated to helping customers save money by reducing their electric bills; 8 staff work with low-income customers and programs as part of their jobs.
- We acquire conservation as a low-cost power resource, because it's good for our customers, and to comply with state mandates.
- State law requires Tacoma Power to use specific methods and assumptions from the Northwest Power and Conservation Council to determine if programs are cost effective.



••• DEFERRED LOAN DETAILS



Tacoma Power offers a grant and deferred loan that cover 100% of project cost; we lien property to ensure repayment

Customer enjoys energy savings, increased home beauty, and comfort when equipment is installed; loan payments are deferred

Customer repays the loan using equity from their home; loan is paid back when the home sells or is occupied by somebody else

Increase participation by offering a comprehensive measure package

- Insulation (attic, wall, floor)
- Windows (single & double)
- Ductless Heat Pumps
- Custom Projects





Develop multiple ways of reaching low-income customers

- Deferred Loan Primary program expected to serve the majority of low-income customers that need energy efficiency improvements
- Community Partner Program Maximum incentives intended to leverage existing external programs with minimal paperwork
- Rental and multifamily Incentives and programs targeting rental and multifamily properties. Looking to supplement with policy based solutions from the AHAS effort.

Sustainability Small Grant Overview: Leah Michaelson

There are five small grants for quarter three 2019.

- Center for Food Preservation Arts: To build 20 sharing parkway vegetable gardens, with 2
 12'x4'x8" raised beds per site and sharing the harvest with a sharing table for the neighborhood to use.
- **Food is Free Project Tacoma:** To build 20 sharing parkway vegetable gardens, with 2 12'x4'x8" raised beds per site and sharing the harvest with a sharing table for the neighborhood to use.

- ForeverGreen Trails: Annual meeting of trail users, volunteers, developers, funders and advocates providing information on progress in development of countywide trail system and education on topics related to benefits of trails and active transportation. 2019 conference title is Sustainability & Stewardship. Includes panels on Trial Safety & Sustainability and Youth Involvement.
- **Safe Streets**: Collaborate with Tacoma Metro Parks to establish a demonstration pollinator garden in Alling Park. The native and other pollinator-friendly plants selected for the garden will be used to engage and educate the Tacoma community about the many benefits of habitat gardening. The garden will also become a venue for talks on native pollinators.
- Wellspring IV Presented by PureBlue: Gathering of water operators, business leaders, policymakers, and water entrepreneurs to discuss solutions to key water issues, featuring plenary sessions, peer to peer roundtable discussions, tours of water research centers and networking opportunities.

TPU Low Income Energy Conservation Program – Staff Presentation:

At approximately 5:15 p.m. Francine Artis, Customer Service, TPU presented low income programs including, an overview, utility bill assistance programs, background on the customer solutions office, customer assistance, and Bill Credit Assistance Plan (BCAP) and Discount Rate half year reports. She continued with marketing and outreach; including banners, counter stands, posters, and tables clothes, brochures in multiple languages, community events. Finishing with future considerations to streamline eligibility, processes, and information.

Francine introduced Jeremey Stewart, Customer Energy Programs, TPU. He presented Tacoma Power low-income energy efficiency programs including, background on the Tacoma Power customer energy programs, cost effective challenges, low income spending, deferred loan details, future program plans, and participation in the Affordable Housing Action Strategy (AHAS).

STC-City Council Engagement Meetings – Debrief – Postponed.

Climate Change Emergency Resolution – Kristi Lynett

Kristi Lynett refers to the last STC meeting with Council Member Mello where he introduces that he is drafting a Climate Change Emergency Resolution. Council Member Mello provides the draft Resolution to the STC for review. Discussion ensues regarding drafting a letter of support, the language in the draft Resolution including the desire to take a more factual approach, with very clear and concise information and the agreement of the STC supporting the declaration of a Climate Emergency.

Comments are needed back to Council Member Mello by Wednesday, October 30, 2019.

Approval of draft letter including 1. Inherency. 2. Support to OEPS by elevating its role into the City Manager's Office to support City-wide activities and its expanded scope of services. 3. Develop funding

and cost estimates, and adequately fund the work. 4. Support community mobilization around climate and acknowledge youth leadership. 5. Leverage partners for efficiency and effectiveness.

Pat Babbitt gives an update as to where the Subcommittee's currently stand and who is on each. These assignments will be revisited in the November or December meeting when new Commissioners are onboarded.

Staff Updates -

Pat Babbitt reminds Commissioners about the second Urban Forestry Management Plan public survey as well as to take a Doodle poll to confirm their availability for potential November and December meeting dates. He confirms delivering the Commission's letter of support for the drafted Clean Fuel Standard resolution. He also provides a brief update on subcommittee work on a letter of support for the Urban Forestry Management Plan and research into building electrification.
