NWSA 5-Year Draft Implementation Plan –

Land Side

Continue to enforce our Clean Truck standards

- Reduce diesel emissions from drayage trucks through scrap/replace incentives, renewable fuels, etc.
- Promote region- or state-wide transition to zero-emission trucks (collaboration, infrastructure, demonstrations, etc.)
- Complete zero-emission projects at South Intermodal Yard (six electric yard tractors) and EB1 Terminal (electric forklift)
- Reduce energy use by ≈ 60% at North Intermodal Yard and EB1 Terminal though LED lighting upgrades
- Work with partners to plan, implement and fund other CHE and truck demonstration projects





THE NORTHWEST SEAPORT ALLIANCE SEATTLE + TACOMA NWSA 5-Year Draft Implementation Plan – Vessels

 Install shore power at Husky Terminal & Terminal 5; complete design at Terminal 18

 Maximize shore power use in partnership with shipping lines, terminal operators, and utilities

 Analyze and implement other methods to reduce emissions from vessels

Port of Tacoma 5-Year Implementation Plan

- Launch Clean Buildings Initiative to identify and achieve additional energy efficiency improvements
- Integrate sustainable features and EV charging in the new Port of Tacoma Admin. Building facility
- Develop sustainable building policy for major remodels and new construction of port-owned buildings
- Transition port-owned fleet of administration vehicles to plug-in hybrid or electric vehicles by 2030
- Advocate for supportive policy and funding






2019 TACOMA COMMUNITY EMISSIONS

Low Carbon Scenario Milestones

- Only 12% of new homes are built are single family and almost all near corridors and mixed-use centers
- 100% of new builds are built to net zero carbon standards
- 12% of existing commercial buildings are retrofit to net zero carbon
- 7% of existing industrial buildings floor space is retrofit to net zero carbon
- Almost twice as many people need to take transit and shift to bicycling and walking than do now.
- 100% new passenger vehicle sales are EV
- 30% of transit zero emission
- Ferries electrified
- Per capita waste generation reduced by 18%

Call to Order

This meeting was called to order by Commission Chairperson Lexi Brewer at 5:05pm, including an acknowledgement of the occupied indigenous lands this Commission conducts its business on. The Chair welcomed Commissioners, staff, and members of the public and shared virtual meeting practices and requirements.

No public comment was delivered in writing or given in meeting.

Staff Updates

Patrick Babbitt, the Commission's staff liaison, recounted the Sustainable Tacoma Commission's (STC) May meeting activities and then delivered new notices to the Commission. New notices included reminding the Commission that Sustainability Small Grants Program applications are accepted for the second quarter of 2021 through June 30; that the Tacoma Climate Action Survey closes June 22; and that two new dates have been added to the Commission's schedule to meet with City Council Members to discuss the Commission's annual priorities and recommendations. He also noted other happenings in the Tacoma community, including local health regulations and COVID-19 vaccination opportunities. He pointed to resources if Commissioners or community members they are in contact with would like more information.

Staff thanked Commissioners for their work outside meetings, including subcommittees.

Subcommittee Updates

Patrick updated the Commission that it's Waste Prevention and Recycling Subcommittee is scheduled to meet on Wednesday, June 23 from 5-6pm. Interested Commissioners should engage Patrick of their Chairpersons to participate. Chair Lexi Brewer reported the Climate Action Planning Subcommittee did not meet this past month but instead worked offline to simplify its inventory of climate action plan elements that Tacoma should consider incorporating. The Subcommittee continues to work on final recommendations to staff regarding Tacoma's next climate action plan. No further updates were provided by Commissioners regarding subcommittee activities.

Commission Business Items

Port of Tacoma & Northwest Seaport Alliance's Clean Air Strategy – Graham VanderSchelden, Steve Nicholas

Graham led a presentation providing the Commission with information about the Port of Tacoma, Northwest Seaport Alliance, their jurisdictions and operations, and strategies to reduce air pollution through their joint Clean Air Strategy. They have set a goal to phase out emissions from greenhouse gases and diesel particulate matter by 2050. They have demonstrated a significant decrease in diesel particulate matter emissions since 2005. Shared objectives across northwest ports (Vancouver, BC, Seattle, Tacoma) include: (1) efficiency, fleet modernization, and interim fuels; (2) infrastructure to support zero-emissions equipment; and (3) adoption of zero-emissions equipment. Focus areas for action include ocean-going vessels, harbor vessels, cargo handling equipment, trucks, rail, and port administration and tenant facilities. The Port and Seaport Alliance plan to adapt their management approach to emissions as conditions change, working from 5-year implementation plans focused on different emissions sources and portions of operations. Most emissions come from ocean-going vessels and then trucks and rail, as shown in Figure 1 below. In addressing emissions through the Clean Air Strategy, the Port and Seaport Alliance are seeking to be conscientious of environmental health disparities. In

developing this Clean Air Strategy, they have engaged various stakeholders across jurisdictions and plan to finalize 5-year implementation plans through November 2021. The Commission encouraged the process to better engage with the Puyallup Tribe of Indians, which to date had not accepted invitations to participate by providing input.

City of Tacoma Climate Action Planning Process Update – Patrick Babbitt, Kristin Lynett, Office of Environmental Policy & Sustainability (OEPS), City of Tacoma

Patrick updated the Commission on recent climate action planning work. He provided a detailed report about progress in the second phase of community engagement to the Commission by email. Primarily he refreshed the Commission on input from over 450 community members from the first phase of engagement, the latest local climate science, and established City policies to guide Commission input on climate strategies and actions to be discussed as the next item of business.

City of Tacoma Climate Action Planning Process Update – Patrick Babbitt, Kristin Lynett, Office of Environmental Policy & Sustainability (OEPS), City of Tacoma

Patrick led Commissioners through a Mentimeter survey to give their input about four areas of climate strategies and actions. Then, the Commission had some discussion about the input they gave through Mentimeter. Commission feedback was recorded through Mentimeter and staff notes, which will be considered alongside input from other stakeholders and the wider community.
