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<p>Anthony Dluzak</p>		<p>Over a period of eight years, Anthony organized and has continually urged the growth of a large community that rejoices in audience participation for the recognition of beloved cult cinema. He is one of the many unsung local heroes who diligently contributes to the community, motivated by his love for the cult genre. For him, Friday Night Frights is truly a labor of love. It is a project he will continue to pursue for no other reason than it enriches the experience of others.</p>	<p>Eight years ago, Anthony Dluzak saw a large hole in the Tacoma art scene. He knew there was a huge community of cinephiles who craved cult movies from the '70 and '80s. He knew this because he was part of that community. So he took it upon himself to orchestrate Friday Night Frights, a monthly showing of cult cinema. He has gathered sponsors from local businesses for support. He has gathered a wide talent pool of artists to create monthly art for the event. Friday Night Frights, aka FNF, is a profitable collaboration for the artists as their work sells heavily at FNF and event conventions. FNF is a large revenue generator for the Blue Mouse Theater, a co-op-owned theater. Heavily promoted on social media by photographs and art created for Friday Night Frights, the Blue Mouse Theater, the sponsors and the artists receive high recognition for their contributions. Anthony is beloved for his ongoing efforts by the community he supports and by the artists he has brought in this creative venture.</p>	<p>I was invited to be one of the artists to create movie poster art for Friday Night Frights.</p>
<p>Curtis Ashby</p>	<p>Curtis Ashby Art CurtisAshbyArt.com</p>	<p>Curtis Ashby deserves this recognition on behalf of the beautiful art he has blessed Tacoma and surrounding cities. Curtis grew up a shy person, afraid of talking to people outside of his daily life. Curtis's love of art has enabled him to talk to others about his artistic passion and encouraged them to display his art. Among his first public art, while he was still in high school, was a canvas painting and wall art in the Farelli's Pizza on 6th Avenue in Tacoma. Curtis enjoyed seeing others admire his work, which gave him confidence to continue with the public art journey. Curtis has developed as a person and artist, and now is extremely talkative about art and is able to understand verbal ideas and descriptions to transfer them into a visual display. Curtis was well on his journey of beautifying the City of Tacoma when the Pandemic of 2020 forced the Country to stay home. Businesses were closed and windows were covered with wood to protect the glass. Curtis worked with small businesses to decorated large blank areas that lined so many streets to add a glimmer of hope and joy into their life in these unusual times.</p>	<p>In 2016, Curtis was selected by the City of Tacoma to join the Tacoma mural roster. From 2016-2018 he created two murals for the city, including a 200 ft. long mural on South Tacoma Way for the Water Flume Line Trail Project. In the summer of 2019, he created a mural for the Tahoma Audubon Society which spans the entire length of the building. After completion of the mural, Curtis was awarded the Distinguished Service Community Award for his work. Spring of 2020, Curtis was selected by Spaceworks, a Tacoma city and chamber resource program, to be a part of their Rapid Response Mural Project. He painted the boarded-up windows of three different buildings in Tacoma. December of 2021, Curtis joined the Metro Parks Tacoma Arts & Heritage Council.</p> <p>Curtis has exhibited community outreach by approval from the Tacoma Arts Commission, Metro Parks Tacoma, City of Tacoma, Tahoma Audubon Society, businesses, and property owners to paint murals in Tacoma. Community engagement is displayed by the murals around Tacoma and the business associations he is affiliated. Curtis exhibits community involvement when he teaches the community how to paint such as the bird house event in association with the Tahoma Audubon Society.</p>	<p>Not only is Curtis my son, but he is also a very talented artist who has brightened up Tacoma and surrounding cities with his art. We are privileged to have his talent available for others to enjoy.</p>

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Curtis Ashby		Curtis holds two necessary elements to be an incredible artist: passion and patience. What sets him apart is that his patience and passion extends beyond his own work. He thrives in scenarios where he can share art and support others as they continue to create or they create their very first piece. He shows the same amount of enthusiasm to a child painting a birdhouse as he does to a career artist. He has a way of uplifting those around them through art by providing direction but celebrating unique ideas.	Curtis has shared his passion for art with a variety of businesses, government agencies, and organizations in and around Tacoma. I have never heard of him turning down a partnership (unless it is due to capacity), which shows that he chooses to engage with the community as a whole rather than limit himself to specific group. His dynamism has allowed the opportunity to work on large murals which showcase the beauty of the Northwest but also facilitates opportunity for the community to participate. Curtis has made painting a mural more than just adding color to a wall: he has hired apprentices (when possible) to provide opportunity for teenage artist to build their portfolio; he has taken the time with every interested bystander to talk about the project and welcome their input; and he has allowed some volunteers to literally "put their mark" on the mural even if it is painting the background or filling in the trees. I foresee more artist emerging from Tacoma in the future, artist that may have needed the confidence boost and support that Curtis provided when he taught a Master Class at Hunt Middle School or the Birdhouse Painting Class with the Tacoma Audubon Society. She uses her spare time to document the natural beauty (...or the unnatural ugliness) of the Pacific Northwest with her camera, including in and around her home town of Tacoma. As a photographer, Roxann likes to find beauty in the little things (and big things) in nature, from up close enough to smell them photos of vibrant roses in the Point Defiance rose garden (or those in her own garden); to macro photos of dewdrops on fungi, shot while sprawled out, army-crawling style in the dirt at a marine reserve; and distance shots of local humpback whale at the Tacoma Dune Park. However, Roxann also uses her camera lens as a cultural, environmental, and social justice lens to capture and highlight for others to see the injustices here and across the Pacific Northwest. From photo- documenting environmental protests to social justice rallies, art, and speaking events, Roxann uses her camera eye to speak truth to what happens around her, and therefore the rest of us here too, while standing up for what is right as a local indigenous woman of power, talented art, and courageous voice.	Roxann uses photography to tell stories. Many are beautiful stories. A lot of those involve nature and candid views of people in social justice action, and close friends and family too. She was recently recognized by South Sound Magazine as a local photographer highlight. But she also tells horror stories with her photos. Stories of tragedy. Stories of capitalist avarice that destroys and hurts the beauty of nature, among many other things while claiming words like "progress". These are the photos that people don't like to see but need to see. These are the photos that city representation needs to see. Photos of ugly LNG tank lights polluting the night sky when there is supposed to be an endangered species aquatic luminary along Thea Foss Waterway. Photos of the silted and spoiled Puyallup estuary, continually engineered like an environmental Frankenstein's monster, or photos of beautiful Mt. Tahoma... blinded by smog. And it's great to see people gathered together to speak in the park. But they shouldn't have to be there doing such because protesting things like black lives and women's rights is getting really old. 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Steve La Berge		<p>I nominate him for the AMOCAT award because he has brought so much life to Tacoma’s art scene, and has pulled along others with him in collaboration. He has worked closely with Rosemary Ponnekanti (Tacoma Light Trail), Alma Mater, and many non-profits such as Northwest Designer Craftsmen, the Puget Sound Revels, First Night’s Wear White Party fundraiser, MoPop, and myself.</p> <p>His traveling sculptures are sometimes as high as 20’ and in the case of the dragon on wheels, it also breathes fire. Others include a reclining love seat, a Venetian Gondola, a 16’ rainbow, a slug-like sound chamber that is interactive and a 10’ high heart on wheels and his famous space orb which has made appearances in over 20 local park sites.</p> <p>Steve involved 20 local artists in collaboration of the design of each of his oversized fiberglass tvs – another interactive sculpture measuring 20’ tall. All of these creations include thousands of colored LED lights. With his work he has identified Tacoma as an art town and helped us cement our identity – on top of everything else, he is a delightful person to work with.</p>	<p>Steve’s daytime job is insurance salesman, yet he has taught himself to create large fiberglass sculptures which house thousands of programmed LEDs. 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Tamiko Nimura		<p>Tamiko is dedicated to thoughtfully telling the histories and stories of our community so that we can learn, grow, and heal. She has organized free public programming (South Sound Day of Remembrance), literary readings, and other programs to bring more visibility to these histories.</p>	<p>Tamiko has been a co-organizer of the South Sound Day of Remembrance (in collaboration with the Washington State History Museum), commemorating the anniversary of the forced wartime eviction of Japanese Americans in Tacoma during WW2. This event is an opportunity for our community to reflect on the historical connections and parallels between past and present. Event programming has included a screening of a theater performance, poetry and literary readings, guided historical walks, and visual art.</p> <p>Tamiko Nimura, a creative nonfiction writer and public historian from Tacoma. She is the author of <i>Rosa Franklin: A Life in Health Care, Public Service, and Social Justice</i> (2019) and the co-author of a graphic novel, <i>We Hereby Refuse: Japanese American Resistance to Wartime Incarceration</i> (May 2021). She is currently working on a memoir, <i>Pilgrimage: One Japanese American Daughter's Journey through Grief, Memory, and History</i>. Spaceworks	Spaceworks began as a program of the Tacoma Chamber of Commerce to mitigate the appearance of blight in downtown Tacoma by engaging artists in activating empty storefronts. Since that time Spaceworks has grown to become an organization that has fostered the careers of scores of artists and creative businesses, predominantly artists and business owners who are women and/or BIPOC, in Tacoma. Most recently, Spaceworks leapt in when trouble popped up. Over the course of the past two years, anger following the death of George Floyd and the pandemic stressed us all, artists and businesses faced economic hardship, and many businesses (particularly those owned by people of color) had windows (often repeatedly) broken and boarded up. Almost immediately, Spaceworks called on its networks and provided compensation for local artists to utilize boarded up storefronts and construction sites as canvases for art that validated, comforted, delighted, and inspired us.	Spaceworks has an ever-expanding network of local artists who are able to quickly and skillfully respond to local interest in community public art (particularly 2D art like murals). These artists are available to be called-upon when an opportunity is offered for temporary (as on a boarded up window) or a more permanent placement (as with a recent project of creatively painted signage on street drains to discourage dumping of oil into the bay). Utilizing a clear cost analysis tool, Spaceworks is able to work directly with stakeholders like building owners to help them view portfolios of work, select an artist, and understand cost projections. At the same time, Spaceworks coordination ensures that the vision of a selected artist reflects the needs, aspirations and goals of the neighborhood and the community. Spaceworks is quite literally building arts into our daily lives.	I have been a member of the Spaceworks Steering Committee for 4 years.

Tacoma Light Trail	Tacoma Light Trail started in December 2020 - when the pandemic was in full swing and our community was in the depths of isolation coupled with a very dark and cold winter. Tacoma Light Trail was an idea to provide our community with a reason to get out and feel like a part of the community again, in a very safe and physically isolated way. The organizers assembled a walkable/bikeable/drivable "trail" of light-based art, coupled with sound art, that was meant to delight and bring a smile to Tacoma when practically no other art forms were available to experience live and in-person.	Tacoma Light Trail started as the vision of Rosemary Ponnekanti in 2020 and has since grown to a small team of dedicated creatives who are working together to create a lively and fun experience for all ages. The event has run 2 years so far - during the height of the Covid-19 pandemic - and is truly a ray of light for Tacoma. The event feature a wide variety of light-based art - from sculptures to projections to installations and more. And each site is paired with a recording of music or poetry or other sound-based art, turning this in to a multi-media experience, accessible through a QR code. The event is free and ongoing every evening for several weeks. And, in 2022, they added on free live weekend programming as well - live music, circus performers, dance, and more. Their goal is "To uplift and unify our community during dark times." and they have definitely succeeded in that.	Tacoma Light Trail is a Community Arts Projects fundee and I have been on the tour two years now.

Rebecca and Jack Benaroya	Rebecca and Jack Benaroya deserve to be recognized for their gift of a new wing and the art to fill this wing to the Tacoma Art Museum. Bebecca and Jack Benaroya have been nominated for the arts patron awards several times, but the Tacoma Arts Commission thought it would be better to wait until the new wing opened to give them the award. Then the pandemic came along, and everything came to a stop. The new wing opened over three years ago, but it will continue to enhance the arts community and give access to artworks for decades to come to the citizens of Tacoma. Just because this happened three years ago is no reason that Rebecca and Jack Benaroya should not be honored for their wonderful gift to the Tacoma Art Museum and to the people of Tacoma.	Rebecca and Jack Benaroya donated 9.2 million dollars to the Tacoma Art Museum for the construction of a new wing to the museum. This new wing added 6,860 square feet to the existing structure. 4550 square feet of this new wing was available for display of artworks. This increased the display space of the museum by 25%. Not only did they donate the funds for the new wing, but they also donated 353 works of art for possible display in the wing. As part of the gift, they also established an endowment for the care of the collection and a curatorial position. This wing opened to the public on January 19, 2019. Because of this gift the Tacoma Art Museum now has one of the top five collections of studio glass in the nation.
