<u>Question:</u> What about mixed housing? There are good examples in Seattle of small business owners have mix used spaces and it allows them to pay one rent or utility bill.

- Answer: Home in Tacoma has taken some steps in that direction. Current zoning code adopted in the 1950's, and it simplistic in what is allowed. We are making some progress with live/work zoning; however, the primary focus is residential. Mr. Barnett encourages people to become housing champions or submit feedback in the survey.
- Question: What effort is the city making to make sure that developers are creating real/lasting affordable housing? What are the accountability measures?
- Answer: Part of the work of Home in Tacoma is to ensure that that there is lasting housing affordability. It takes a lot of advocacy & community voices to ensure the long-range affordability.
- Question: Why is the Home Equity Champion stipends being given through gift cards?
- The gift card stipends are the City's first step in compensating community members and understand that there are improvements to be made. The city welcomes additional feedback and solutions on how to improve

IX. City Staff Updates - Staff Liaison Raeshawna Ware

a. CIRA Recruitment

Four members that we would love to have re-apply. Liaison Ware will make sure the re-application process is simple.

Two Vacant Positions (Alternate and Youth Position).

b. Budget Information

CIRA's budget is included in OEHR's annual budget, which is approved by the City Council.

There are three levels of where the budget comes from: OEHR Operational Funds, Citywide Budget, Council Contingency Funds.

How to put in request:

- 1. Determine if it's operational (supports CIRA) or institutional (should be part of a department budget).
- 2. Determine the cost of the request.
- 3. Write a description of the recommendation & the associated cost.
- 4. Send the recommendation for the spending of funds to the Staff Liaison.

Director Lisa Woods, adding comments:

If CIRA sees needs in Community: NCS manages community service contracts. They have a regular cycle of federal funds that community can apply to. While CIRA cannot apply directly, but they can advocate with the Human Services Commission to make sure community members can get access.

Arts and Cultural Vitality – also is source for funding.

We start with base line budget; we don't start for \$0 every year. We are still building on creating a robust budget of detailed line items for CIRA.

Commissioner Villegas: Is there a way to get more specific line items for items like food, interpretation services, etc.?

Commissioner Nicolas: CIRA needs to start thinking about how we use our budget, how we prioritize, and how we might change can our bylaws to be most effective

c. Welcoming Interactive

- Are there other ways that we can get funding (grants, etc.) to send more people? The interactive provides scholarships, so
- Are there any limitations on sponsorships/ Can CIRA fundraise? If there are organizations that willing to send CIRA.

General Discussion Comments:

Valdez Castro: Bringing awareness to a mass shooting in Southern California after a Lunar New Year Festival.

Could CIRA make a statement condemning the violence and making a statement of a right to gather?

There is a lot of fear in the AAPI Community as Lunar New Year celebration continue through the month.

Chair Donaldson will connect with Commission Castro

Liaison Ware – suggests making statements at the CVS Committee, to gather comments from Council Members regarding the tragedy.

- Direction:
 - Expand tools to address affordability and anti-displacement
 - Evaluate public facility and service needs
 - Shift towards form-based codes






Zoning

Adopted policy direction

- Missing Middle Housing (citywide, systematic approach)
- Low-scale and Mid-scale areas
- Housing types, number of units

Key decisions

- **How many zoning districts** (what factors should inform this)?
- How should zoning reflect neighborhood distinctions?
- What should **lot standards** be (such as width, area)?
- What should **permit and notification processes** be?



Standards

Adopted policy direction

- Support middle housing development
- Compatibility with residential patterns (such as building size, yards, access)
- Meet multiple goals affordability, choice, ownership, sustainability, accessibility, reuse and more
- Infrastructure supports growth

Key decisions

- How should we balance housing production versus other goals?
- How can standards promote desired features?
- What **functional and feasibility considerations** must inform standards?
- How can **infrastructure** keep pace?







Affordability and Anti-displacement




Calibrate standards to promote affordability
