 - **4.** Need to have a multi-tiered approach
 - 5. The City is doing a great job to integrate services of various wide-range of agencies

Staff Report: Andreta Armstrong reported that the City hired Russ Alarcon as the Fair Housing Coordinator.

Commission Discussion:

- The Commission discussed giving guest speakers at HRC meetings a \$50 honorarium—when speaker is not a City or State employee.
- Andreta will ask Chief Equity Officer is the Commission can pay \$50 honorarium to speaker, without using the \$1,500 annual budget allotted for each Commission within OEHR.
- The four cases (companion housing cases) before the Commission were approved.
- The Commission discussed Chief Moore not attending last month's HRC meeting.
- The Commission decided to form a committed to develop a response to the Crime Reduction Plan
- Comments about Chief Moore's Crime Reduction Plan include:
 - O Not enough information about the causes of crime;
 - o Lacked systemic issues;
 - o Did not address Mental Health services;
 - o Lacked a clear equitable approach
 - o Lacked community involvement in determining issues and possible resolutions
- 2022 Retreat Planning
 - O Human Rights will ask Clerk's Office about the appropriate ways to meet. Can the Commission meet in a park, instead of a virtual meeting?
