- Permanent housing includes: Client owns the unit with or without a subsidy, Rapid Re-Housing (RRH), Rental by client with RRH subsidy, Rental by client with Veteran Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) housing subsidy, rental by client with other ongoing housing subsidy, Staying or living with family (Permanent Tenure), and staying or living with friends (Permanent Tenure)
- Engaged in case management includes meeting with a case manager to get support with, but not limited to the following:
 - Supportive service connections
 - Housing Stability Plan
 - Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder
 - Employment
 - Education
 - Medical
 - Entitlement and Benefits
