Overview

Comprehensive Plan and Growth Management Act

Tacoma's Comprehensive Plan, One Tacoma, is the City's official guide documenting its vision for future growth and development. It identifies goals, policies, and strategies for maintaining the health, welfare, and quality of life of Tacoma's residents. The Comprehensive Plan is comprised of numerous individual elements, including elements addressing such important issues as urban form, design and development, environment and watershed health, parks and recreation, housing, and economic development. The Transportation Master Plan (TMP) is the Transportation Element of the Comprehensive Plan.

The City of Tacoma amends its Comprehensive Plan on an annual basis as permitted by state law. In addition to these regular amendments, the Growth Management Act (GMA) requires counties and cities to periodically conduct a thorough review of their plans and regulations to bring them in line with any relevant changes in the GMA, and to accommodate updated growth targets.

Tacoma last completed such a "periodic update" in 2015 and is mandated to undertake and complete another "periodic update" by December 2024. In addition, the City of Tacoma is the designated "Metropolitan City" for Pierce County and is allocated, through Vision 2050 and the Countywide Planning Policies, to accommodate a significant share of the region's population and employment growth. The Puget Sound Regional Council evaluates and certifies local comprehensive plans for consistency with the multi-county planning policies. The Comprehensive Plan update will include a review and update to ensure consistency with the goals and policies of Vision 2050

Transportation Master Plan

As stated above, the TMP is the Transportation Element of the Comprehensive Plan and is the longrange blueprint for travel and mobility within Tacoma. The GMA specifically requires that the Transportation Element be "consistent with and implements the land use element." Consistency means that the transportation plan be sufficient in scope (projects, funding, and level of service) to carry out the Land Use Element. The TMP update will assess citywide multimodal transportation needs and guide prioritization of investments over a 20-year planning horizon. The TMP update will define transportation goals, policies, and projects, and respond to transformations that are occurring through zoning changes and emerging policy and technology trends.

Next Steps

The City's Transportation Commission and Planning Commission will help guide the Comprehensive Plan and Transportation Master Plan effort and will provide recommendations to the City Council. In order to ensure the focus of the plan is consistent with the community's vision, public outreach will be a major component of the plan development process. The Planning Commission received a Comprehensive Plan overview presentation at their January 18 meeting.

- February June 2023: Scoping, Existing Conditions, Public Engagement Plan
- June December 2023: Community Visioning, Future Conditions, Policy Review (TC and PC coordination)
- January June 2024: Draft Plan (TC and PC coordination)
- June December 2024: PC and CC Review

Subject: 6-Year Transportation Improvement Program – Overview

Overview of Program

The Washington State Growth Management Act (GMA) requires that transportation planning and system development support the broader, long-range goals for community development. The GMA specifies transportation as a required element of a comprehensive plan. Additionally, all cities, towns, and counties are required to develop and adopt a six-year transportation improvement program (TIP), also known as a transportation improvement plan.

The TIP is a short-range planning document that is updated every year and shows the funding sources and amounts for transportation improvement projects planned for the next six years. The TIP must be consistent with the comprehensive plan. Each jurisdiction must review and update its TIP every year, following one or more public hearings. For cities, the deadline for adoption is July 1

The TIP is necessary to allow cities and counties to obtain state and federal funding. For a project to obtain funding from the state, it must appear in the agency's current program. Since the state also disperses federal highway funds, this requirement applies to federally-funded projects as well. The Six-Year Transportation Improvement Program lists planned transportation projects for the remaining year and the ensuing six years. The program includes roadways, bridges, non-motorized facilities, sidewalks and other capital related transportation projects. The program is based upon anticipated revenues versus desirable projects. There are always more projects than available revenues.

It is also important to note that the adoption of the program does not irreversibly commit the City of Tacoma to construct the projects. A project may be canceled at any time during the course of study or design. The program may at any time be revised by a majority of the City Council, but only after a public hearing.
