Tacoma's recycling is changing. Here's what you need to know.



Contamination is a Problem

Placing dirty and/or non-recyclable items into the curbside bin is causing increased costs for Tacoma and for the entire recycling industry.

To maintain our curbside recycling service, Tacoma is adding a \$2.82/month surcharge to residential utility bills starting January 1, 2020.





No Residential Curbside Glass or Batteries

Curbside glass collection will be replaced with five glass drop-off stations throughout the city. Regular curbside glass collection will continue until these locations are finalized in early 2020.





No Plastic Bags or Shredded Paper

Plastic bags and shredded paper will no longer be accepted in residential curbside recycling bins.

Keep it simple by not using plastic bags! Tacoma banned plastic bags in 2017, so be sure to bring your own bag when shopping.

If you do end up with plastic bags, check with your local grocery store for a collection bin or bring them to the Tacoma Recycle Center.
